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2015 Exhibitor Post-Show Report

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The Largest Solar Conference in North America Continues to Grow

Solar Power International (SPI) 2015, the annual event of the Solar Energy Industries Association (SEIA) and the Solar Electric Power Association (SEPA), concluded with strong momentum, solidifying it as North America's only major solar energy event to continue on a strong growth trajectory.

Indicative of the top solar event on the continent, coupled with an industry on the move, SPI 2015 experienced continued year-over-year growth with upwards of 15,200 solar energy leaders converging in Anaheim to attend top-tier educational programming, network with industry peers, and do business on the expansive, 220,000-plus square-foot exhibition floor. Conference statistics—attendees and exhibition square footage—bested last year's figures.

This year's conference was a newsmaker on several fronts, from Vice President Joe Biden's address to the delegates, to companies launching new products on the show floor to major industrywide initiatives. SEIA and SEPA both made headlines with announcements that promise to alter the industry landscape—underscoring how SPI serves as the industry's annual town square where solar energy professionals gather, business gets done, and news is made.



Nearly a third of SPI 2015 attendees held an Executive or VP level management positions, with direct influence over buying decisions across the global solar industry.




